

PROTOCOL

OF THE ELEVENTH SESSION OF THE FLEMISH-HUNGARIAN INTERGOVERNMENTAL JOINT COMMISSION

Budapest, January 11, 2022

The Eleventh Session of the Flemish-Hungarian Joint Commission took place in Budapest, on January 11, 2022 with the intention of both delegations, hereafter called the Sides, to agree upon the content of the Cooperation Programme for the years 2022-2024.

The Hungarian delegation was led by József Magyar Deputy State Secretary for the Development of European Relations of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade of Hungary. The Flemish delegation was led by Mrs Julie Bynens Secretary General of the Flanders Chancellery & Foreign Office.

The Flemish-Hungarian Joint Commission, which was established in 1995, proved to be a successful framework for cooperation between Hungary and Flanders. The Joint Commission turned into a valuable mediator-forum, where the Sides can take the opportunity to identify the potential areas and forms of cooperation. The entities of both sides participating in the cooperation over the years have established broad framework of ties serving for valuable exchange of knowledge and expertise and enabling meeting of experts and the business communities of both sides on regular bases.

The meeting of the Co-Chairs was held in a cordial warm and friendly atmosphere reflecting common intention to strengthen and develop bilateral cooperation on the basis of mutual benefit.

The Co-Chairs share the opinion that Europe is momentarily facing challenges like never before. A direct and sincere dialogue will lead to common understanding in the different areas, crucial for the future success of Europe. Europe is based on mutual respect for each other's cultures, identities, traditions and on a set of shared values. In this spirit both sides agreed on the need to cooperate, to keep the lines open between them and enhance and broaden our cooperation and strengthen our dialogue.

Both Sides discussed mechanisms for enhancing economic activity disrupted by COVID-19 pandemic in their respective countries, as well as the mechanisms for reducing the negative consequences of the pandemic had on the bilateral economic relations between the two countries.

Besides projects of bilateral nature, both Sides expressed their interest to expand and strengthen bilateral relations by setting long-term strategic goals as new directions for the Joint Commission. The Sides agreed to continue the Joint Committee's work on the basis of a sector-narrowed, project-based cooperation, focusing on concrete actions leading to tangible

results in the agreed areas of cooperation. The goal is to build a solid ground for long term cooperation based on mutual interests through practical initiatives to find solutions for current challenges.

The strategic partnership between Flanders and Hungary is reflected in the intensified economic cooperation, marked by the increasing value of bilateral trade. Both Parties agreed upon the realization of 17 cooperation projects for the years 2022-2024 in the fields of:

- logistic cooperation with focus on ports
- economic, commercial and cluster cooperation
- agriculture with focus on animal welfare
- education
- youth policy
- public health
- scientific research and innovation
- culture
- public diplomacy

The provisions of the present Cooperation Programme do not preclude the possibility of implementing other activities, exchanges or projects that will be negotiated and agreed upon by the Sides through diplomatic channels.

Both sides appreciate the long list of events and meetings the cooperating partners foresee for the upcoming period to implement and expressed their interest to follow up on their realization.

All disputes concerning the interpretation or realisation of the listed projects will be settled through negotiation between the Signatories.

The members of the Flemish and Hungarian delegations attending the Eleventh Session of the Joint Commission are listed in Annex No. 1 and 2 of this Protocol, respectively.

The list of the new or ongoing cooperation projects including the project description, the responsible partners and further provisions, upon which both Parties agreed and to which realization both Parties committed themselves, is included in Annex No. 3.

This Protocol was prepared and signed in Budapest, on January 11, 2022, in two (2) original versions in English language, both texts being equally authentic.

Both Parties agree to hold the next meeting of the Joint Commission in Brussels in 2023, on a date to be agreed upon through diplomatic channels.
